## What is Developmental Education?

## Florida Statute 1004.02

IInstruction through which a high school graduate who applies for any college credit program may attain communication and computation skills necessary to successfully complete college credit instruction.

## Developmental Education Before Senate Bill 1720

- All students take the PERT, a placement test.
Students who do not meet college-ready scores are required to take developmental education courses.
- Students can take other courses while taking dev ed.
- Development Reading I (REA 0007C)
- Developmental Reading II (REA 0017C)
- Developmental Writing I (ENC 0015C)
- Developmental Writing II (ENC 0025C)
- Developmental Math I (MAT 0018C)
- Developmental Math II (MAT 0028C)
- Intermediate Algebra (MAT 1033C)
- Developmental Math/Statistical (MAT 0029C/Statway)

## Developmental Education After Senate Bill 1720

- Some students are exempt:
- cannot be tested
- cannot be required to take developmental courses
- Exempt students-

Entered a FL HS
2003-2004 or later and graduated with a standard diploma, or Are active duty military

- All other students are required to take the common placement test
- All students have options

Exempt students can choose to be tested and enroll in dev ed

Non-exempt students must be provided with non-traditional dev ed options

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## Valencia's Developmental Education Options

- Modularized instruction to address specific skills gaps.
- 1 or 2 credit hour modules that prepare students for college-level course work.
We offer them in English, Reading and Math.
- Compressed course structures that accelerate student progression.

Our traditional developmental courses that are placed into 8 week terms, so that students can move faster through their developmental sequence and begin their collegelevel course work.

## Valencia's Developmental Education Options, continued

- Contextualized instruction related to meta-majors.

Two math course sequence that moves students from developmental course work into college-level statistics in two terms.

This pathway bypasses intermediate algebra and is intended for non-STEM majors.

- Corequisite instruction or tutoring that supplements a credit-bearing course.

Attaching a developmental course to a college-level course, so that students have both levels of instruction at the same time.

## Challenges

- Impact on Student Success and Persistence
"Students don't do optional"
Financial Aid Issues, Withdrawals, etc.
- Impact on Advising

3500 students needing dev ed will be exempt
Intensive support needed to educate students on the ramifications of their choices

- Impact on Instruction

Broader range of skills in the classroom
Greater demand for tutoring and related resources

- Impact on Enrollment Patterns

Increased enrollment in gateway classes like Freshman Comp and College Algebra
