# Policy Statement:

- A. The All full-time College personnel shall have their performance of each career service employee will be reviewed on an annual basis, or more frequently as deemed necessary and appropriate, in writing at least once a year process approved by the College President. The purpose of the each performance evaluation will be for purposes including without limitation:
  - 1. To inform each employee of the quality of his or her performance and job progress.
  - 2. To discuss ways to improve job performance, if required.
  - To provide an opportunity for each employee to discuss job problems and interests with his or her supervisor.
- B. In the event of performance deficiencies, evaluations may be performed more frequently in order to assist the employee in correcting such deficiencies.

Procedure Effective Date: 11/18/1992 Procedure Statement:

- A. The personnel office will forward evaluation forms to departments at the beginning of each fiscal year. Each full-time career service employee who was appointed by June-30 of the previous calendar year, and who is currently employed by the College, will be evaluated.
- B. Evaluations may take place at any time during the first three months of the fiscal year. However, even recently hired employees should be evaluated at the end of this three month period. Evaluations may take place at times other than indicated above if coordinated with the personnel office.
- C. Evaluations may be conducted by the supervisor or the appropriate person designated by the department

Full-time Professional and Career Service employees will be reviewed using the approved Performance Development Process. Administrators will be reviewed by the supervising senior staff member using a process deemed appropriate by the President. Full-time Faculty employees will be reviewed in accordance with processes set forth in the implementing procedures for Policy 6Hx28:3E-02.

# Overtime Compensation for Career Service Employees

# Policy Statement:

- A. At times it will be necessary to require career service employees to work overtime. Overtime must be approved in advance by the appropriate vice president, or a designee.
- B. Career service employees who are assigned to positions which are defined as non-exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act will receive overtime compensation at the rate of one and one-half (1½) times the regular hourly rate of pay for each hour worked in excess of forty (40) hours during the workweek. In lieu of overtime compensation, upon the written request of the employee and the approval of the supervisor, compensatory time at the rate of one and one-half (1½) hours for each hour worked in excess of forty (40) hours during the workweek may be given within one hundred eighty (180) calendar days of the time worked. For the purpose of overtime compensation, holidays, paid non-duty days, sick leave, vacation leave, and other approved leaves with pay will be treated as hours worked.
- C. Career service employees who are assigned to positions which are defined as exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act and are at pay grade 11 through 17 on the college classification and pay plan for career service employees will receive compensatory time off at the rate of one (1) hour off for each hour worked in excess of forty (40) hours during the workweek. If it is not possible to give compensatory time within one hundred eighty (180) calendar days of the time worked, the employee will be paid the their regular hourly rate of pay for each hour worked in excess of forty (40) hours during the workweek.

Procedure Statement:

If an employee is to be paid for overtime work, authorization must be granted in advance by the appropriate vice president or campus president or a designee. Request for payment of overtime will be submitted to the finance office on the Payment for Overtime Work or Compensatory Time Form (DFA-6).

- A. Prior to overtime work being performed, supervisors must get the overtime approved by the appropriate vice president, campus president, or their designee.
- B. Once the supervisor has obtained approval for the overtime they must:
  - a. Identify the employee(s) who will be performing the overtime work and inform them of the overtime requirement
  - b. Determine if the employee(s) performing the overtime work are exempt or non-exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA)
  - c. If they are non-exempt, the supervisor must ask the employee(s) if they prefer to be paid for the overtime or to receive compensatory time off as compensation for the overtime. If the employee(s) chooses comp time, it must be documented in writing prior to the work being performed.
- C. After the overtime work is completed:
  - a. Non-exempt employees must document the hours worked in accordance with established procedures
  - b. Supervisors must confirm that the overtime work was performed and in the case of nonexempt employees that the hours worked was properly documented in accordance with established procedures
- D. The Compensation for Over-time Authorization form is completed and forwarded to payroll for processing.

# 1. Review of Minutes – January 11, 2012 (Attachment)

John Niss asked if everyone has had a chance to review the January minutes. He said that he would like to propose a small change. He had discussed the proposed change with Kim Adams; however, since the proposals had been approved in the particular way the minutes were worded, it was decided to present the minutes as approved and ask for the change at the meeting today.

MGF 1106 and MGF 1107 were approved with the wording, "Minimum grades of C in . . .;" however, the prerequisites are OR, not AND. Therefore, it is not necessary to make the word "grade" plural, since the student only needs to take one of the listed courses. The Committee agreed to this revision by consensus.

Other than the minor change above, the minutes were approved by consensus.

# 3. Regular Agenda

The following three proposals — 1112-069; 1112-071; and 1112-073 were presented at the January 11, 2012 CCC meeting. The two courses, GRA 2225C and GRA 2755C, both have a lab component; however, the lab fees had not been determined. It was the consensus of the Committee for the proposal initiator to go back to the department and determine the fees, bringing them back to the CCC for this meeting. Proposal 1112-073, a Program Modification, was deferred as well, until the fees issue was resolved.

Proposal 1112-069 was approved with the following revision: change the effective date to Summer 2012 (201230). The reason for this is that the department would like to begin offering the course for the summer term, and this will allow them to use the number assigned, rather than offering it as a selected topics course.

Proposal 1112-071 was approved with the following revisions: 1) add "or department approval" to the prerequisites; 2) change the effective date to Summer 2012 (201230). The reason for this is that the department would like to begin offering the course for the summer term, and this will allow them to use the number assigned, rather than offering it as a selected topics course.

In addition, the initiator of the proposals for Graphics Technology, Kristy Pennino, requested that the two courses approved at the January 11, 2012 meeting – GRA 1109 and GRA 2425 – be revised with regard to the effective date, for the same reason noted in the two courses above. This was approved by consensus, so those courses will also be effective Summer 2012 (201230); this will be noted in the January minutes as a revision.

1112-073 Graphics Technology with Specializations: Graphic Design and Interactive Design,
A.S. Degree, CPM ......Kristy Pennino

Purpose: 1) Change program name from "Graphics Technology" to instead be "Graphic & Interactive Design". This change is to provide clarity amongst current and prospective students regarding the program focus and to remove dated/redundant terminology (the term "technology" is a given and causes one to assume the program focus is merely on the technology used within the industry to execute visual solutions); 2) Add 4 new graphics courses to the preapproved "Graphic Design Electives" list of courses (GRA 1109 History of Graphic Design, GRA 2225C Advanced Typography, GRA 2755C Web Development for Designers, GRA 2425 Business and Ethics of Graphic Design). These new courses give students more options to supplement their graphic design education while also providing more course transfer possibilities; 3) Allow Graphics AS Degree seekers to select either POS 2041 US Government or SPC 1017 Interpersonal Communication as a general education requirement. Graphics majors are already required to take a social science, meeting the social science general education requirement, and it has been determined Graphics graduates would benefit a GREAT deal from taking SPC 1017 Interpersonal Communication considering the degree to which the industry requires they use these skills (daily); Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

1112-076 GRA 1933C Fundamentals of Creative Thinking, CCM .......Kristy Pennino *Purpose:* A lab fee of \$46.00 (consistent with shared lab fees for all graphics courses college wide) is being added to this course due to its "C" designation (lab component); *Revised Lab Fees:* \$46.00 (previously, "None"); *Effective Date:* Fall 2012 (201310). Purpose: This course needs to reflect the outcomes of a service-learning experience; Revised Prerequisites: Minimum 2.0 institutional or overall GPA; or department approval (previously, Satisfactory completion of all mandated courses in reading, math, English, and EAP; a minimum 2.0 institutional or overall GPA; and 12 credits. The Program Dir./Program Chair/Program Coordinator or IPO has the discretion to provide override approval as it relates to the waiver of required program/discipline-related courses); Revised Catalog Course Description: This course gives the student the opportunity to grow academically, pre-professionally, personally and civically through participation in a service-learning experience. Students meet real needs in the community by applying knowledge from their courses. Students complete 20 hours of service per credit, complete written reflections, and meet regularly with assigned faculty member. Multiple credit course. May be repeated for a maximum of 4 credits, but grade forgiveness cannot be applied; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposals 1112-088 and 1112-089 were approved by consensus.

Instructional Affairs Committee, and other college groups whose mission directly impacts the proposed changes. On April 22, 2011, a college-wide honors summit was held to give shape to the final form of these ideas. The inaugural class of the James M. and Dayle L. Seneff Honors College will be admitted for academic year 2012-2013. The goal is to create an honors experience that builds on the strengths and flexibility of the present program, while providing purpose and meaning for students and faculty in the Seneff community; *Effective Date:* Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-090 was approved by consensus.

Purpose: Changes were made to Learning Outcomes. In addition, minor change to prerequisites and minor course revision; Revised Prerequisites: ENC 1101 or ENC 1101H or equivalent (previously, Minimum grade of "C" in ENC 1101 or ENC 1101H or IDH 1110); Revised Catalog Course Description: An integrated study of the history, culture, art, literature and music of Latin America. Focuses on how modern Latin American cultures are the product of a historic biological and cultural interchange between Europe, Africa, and the Americas. Topics include pre-Columbian civilizations, the Encounter and its aftermath, independence and neo-colonialism, and modernist art, literature, and cinema. Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple writing assignments. Minimum grade of C required if used to satisfy Gordon Rule requirement; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-091 was approved by consensus with the following revision: the prerequisites will remain as they were. The change proposed was a minor one and it was felt by the CCC that the original wording was clearer.

There was also some discussion about the fact that some portions of certain sections of this course are taught in Spanish. Discussion was mainly about how to communicate this to the students and ensure that only those students with a strong background in Spanish take those sections. After quite a bit of discussion, the issue was deferred to a later date, because there did not seem to be an easy solution to the Banner programming and thus communication to the students of this situation.

Karen Borglum recalled that the minimum grade issue had been discussed and resolved when the B.S. program was originally approved. It had been decided that each course description would end with verbiage that a minimum grade of C is required if the course will be used to satisfy the requirements of the Bachelor's program. It had also been determined that they could not require lower level (1000 and 2000) courses to have been completed with a minimum grade of C, since that is not a requirement for the A.S. degree programs; and, the entire programs as a "package" are what is accepted for entrance into the B.S. program.

The discussion went on for a while without full resolution, and it was decided that the topic will be revisited at a later date.

International Finance, CCA.....Barry Bunn 1112-106 FIN 2051 Purpose: This course will become part of the new International Business specialization; Catalog Course Description: This course is designed for the student to learn the basic concepts and principles of international finance, with consideration of the financial environment, transactions, and flows. Exchange rates, risks, and government policies affecting business are analyzed as well as management policies and decisions; Prerequisites: GEB 1350; Co-requisites: None; Credit/Class (Lecture)/Lab Hours: 3/3/0; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-106 was approved by consensus with the following prerequisite revision: "Minimum grade of C" will be added.

MAR 2150 International Marketing, CCA......Barry Bunn 1112-107 Purpose: This course will become part of the new International Business specialization; Catalog Course Description: This course examines marketing concepts and strategies as applied to global markets. Students will explore the implications of organizing people, process, and technology given the influences of ideas, culture, laws, and economics. The course is intended to be more hands-on, although students will use a combination of text, lectures, case studies, outside reading, company research, video, group work, and presentation to enhance learning and practicing skills; Prerequisites: GEB 1350; Co-requisites: None; Credit/Class (Lecture)/Lab Hours: 3/3/0; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-107 was approved by consensus with the following prerequisite revision: "Minimum grade of C" will be added.

1112-108 **GEB 1350** Introduction to International Business, CCM ......Barry Bunn Purpose: To update description to meet today's global environment. This course will be part of a new specialization entitled International Business. Course outcomes and competencies were also changed; Revised Catalog Course Description: This course is an entry-level overview of current world trade activities, practices, and issues. It is designed to provide the student with a basic, practical understanding of international business operations in the context of global competitiveness, regional trading blocs, and the globalization of world markets; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-108 was approved by consensus.

Business Management, Marketing, and Administration w/Specializations in: 1112-109 Finance, HR Management, Management, Marketing, Property and Casualty Insurance Management, Real Estate Management, and Small Business Management, A.S. Degree, CPM ......Barry Bunn Purpose: To add the International Business Specialization; Effective Date: Fall 2012 (201310).

Proposal 1112-109 was approved by consensus.
